## Class & Faculty Notes

**Significant Losses**—2010 has been a hard year on the Teachers College family. On September 30th **Harvey MacPhee**, WWII Veteran, Canadian Signal Corps, passed away at the age of 92. Mr. MacPhee was a well-known Truro historian and provincial educator who began his teaching career in a one-room schoolhouse in Seabright N.S., and finished as Professor Emeritus at the Nova Scotia Teachers College. In recognition of his significant contribution to education in the province, Mr. MacPhee received many accolades including the Nova Scotia Heritage Award and an honorary Doctorate of Pedagogy from NSTC. In addition to the numerous students he prepared for teaching careers, Mr. MacPhee will be remembered for the significant role he played in establishing the Little White Schoolhouse Museum in Truro. Mr. MacPhee and several other colleagues conceived the idea for a museum, located a suitable school in Riverton, N.S., obtained the necessary provincial approvals for the project, oversaw the school's relocation, and, when completed, he became its first curator. Mr. MacPhee was active in several areas including the Colchester Historical Society, the Nova Scotia Federation of Scottish Clans, the Nova Scotia Federation of Heritage and the Nova Scotia Historical Society.

In addition to Mr. MacPhee's death, losses have included **Doug Grant**, one of the original NSTC members and chair of the Physical Education Program; **George Hillis**, Chair of the Early Childhood Program for many years; **Leslie McKillop**, English Professor and member of the Intermediate Program, and **Bob Russell**, Philosophy Professor and a founding member of the Early Childhood Education and Development Services Program. **Reg Flemming** and **Raymond Matheson** of the NSTC Maintenance Department both also passed away in the last year.

**Alan and Dorothy Bailey** were proud to announce the graduation of their daughter Jane, from Dalhousie University in May. Jane earned a PhD in Computer Science.

**Thomas Acker** enjoyed a month long cross Canada trip in the leisure and comfort of coast-to-

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## Guest Speaker, 40th Annual Reunion Senator Jane Cordy

Probably most graduates of the Nova Scotia Teachers College go into teaching immediately and may move into other fields later. The guest speaker at the Reunion on August 20, 2010 was Senator Jane Cordy, a woman who did both.

Senator Cordy said that she was moved to be speaking that evening. She described the society into which she graduated in 1970. Marcus Welby was a popular television program. Love Story was a current movie. Sydney Crosby and Mike Weir were born in that year.

In some jurisdictions, teachers had to resign after becoming pregnant because this was a “self-inflicted injury”. A married woman had to resign every year in Glace Bay.

Cordy taught for thirty years in Sydney, New Glasgow and the Halifax Regional Municipality in Nova Scotia. After this time, she is still enthusiastic about teaching. “There is no career like it,” she said.

Her life was to change in June of 2000 when she received a call from the Prime Minister at the time, Jean Chrétien, appointing her to the Senate of Canada. A student in her class on hearing that she was becoming a Senator said, “I didn’t even know she played hockey.” She taught in Colby Village and this is where Sydney Crosby was from.

Cordy claims that Sir John A. MacDonald called the unelected Senate, the



“chamber of sober, second thought”. She describes it as “the pause that refreshes”. The 105 members have more time to spend than the House of Commons and do not readily follow the party line. She is a Liberal member and commented that their votes did not always please the government in power at the time.

Senator Cordy spoke of her involvement in the Mental Health and Poverty committees of the Senate. Her biography on the web

site of Parliament tells of other activities such as being a member of the Special Senate Committee on Aging and the NATO Parliamentary Association.

The Senator ended her speech by reciting the story of a former student, “Susie”, who phoned her in her office in Ottawa. The former student came from a dysfunctional family and wished to thank Cordy for what she had done for her. Thus, she connected being a teacher to being a Senator. She loves her job and it showed the night of her speech in Truro. ✍

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## **Nova Scotia Teachers College Foundation    *Scholarships Awarded to Teachers in Training***

The Nova Scotia Teachers College Foundation (NSTC) was established by an Act of the Nova Scotia Legislature (Bill 35) which was given Royal Assent on December 3, 1998. The first Board of Governors was appointed in May 2000.

The Nova Scotia Teachers College Foundation was established to administer the scholarships and awards of the former Nova Scotia Teachers College. Many people donated to the scholarship and award funds of the Teachers College over the years leaving a substantial amount in the funds when the College closed in 1997. The Nova Scotia Teachers College Foundation, through its awards, is helping to preserve the memory of the College and honour some of those who contributed to its success.

The directors of the Foundation meet regularly and the current directors all have ties to the Teachers College. There is no formal link between the Foundation and the Alumni Association however, the current vice-president of the Alumni Association is a Director of the Foundation.

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## Tribute to Irene Reddick, '61

On September 13, 2009 many lost a beloved former teacher, educator and friend in the passing of Irene (Parris) Reddick at her Dartmouth home.

Born on April 18, 1926 in Mulgrave, NS her teaching began very early at a one-room school in Rear Monastery. In the latter part of the 1940's she married Leonard Morell Reddick and the couple had three sons.

Widowed at only 26 she worked at Pictou Shipyards and as a room attendant at Carlsbad Springs in Ottawa.

Irene was much to be commended for returning to school at the age of thirty-four to take grade 11. Following this she and her young family moved to Truro for the year 1960-61. This was so that she could attend Nova Scotia Normal College and become a licenced teacher.

Irene and her sister Sadie had both taught in North Preston and Sadie had married there. It was here that Irene returned in 1961 as a classroom teacher and a principal of primary and elementary schools. Henceforth many of her summers were to be spent attending sessions of Black programs in Halifax.

Teaching, school administration and raising a family required much energy and Irene performed all of this with characteristic gusto. It

was my privilege to have been a member of her teaching staff for the first two years of my own teaching career. Her secret of good performance was ardent organization and she tried with as much diplomacy as possible to draw everybody into the act. Equipped with a keen sense of humour she remarked after what must have been a very trying day, "It's impossible for me not to laugh even when it's not particularly appropriate."

After retiring from her position in North Preston, she served as a resource teacher at Humber Park. For the most part Irene found these years challenging and stimulating. In 1993 she retired from teaching after thirty-nine years of service. The years to come were busy ones. Many of her hours were now spent in quilting. Forever on the quest of new methods and techniques in this hobby, she still retained the key positions of her former career.

Throughout these years Irene remained a very active member of St. Anthony's Catholic Church. For a time she tutored a foreign-born priest in the improvement of his English. She often went on trips related to her church and very shortly before her death St. Anthony's Church presented her with an award for outstanding service.

Late in life Irene said, "Like most persons, I made a number of mistakes in my career. I hope that in the long run I benefited from these!"

## Full Council Meeting October 16, 2010

A Full Council Meeting of the Alumni Association was held at the home of Robert and Audrey Jordan on Saturday October 16, 2010. The meeting was conducted by president Helen MacDonald. Helen welcomed everyone to the meeting.

It was moved by Anne Marie LeBlanc and seconded by Maxine Bezanson to approve the agenda as circulated. Motion carried.

Bill Canning was a guest at our meeting. He was asked to speak about the Building Fund, and how it could be handled by the Little White School House, and the Nova Scotia Teachers College. It was agreed that we let Bill speak first, so he wouldn't have to stay for the entire meeting.

Bill said the LWSH Museum and the NSTC Alumni have a common background. Both of these organizations have artifacts they want to display, and both are interested in preserving the history of teaching in Nova Scotia. Both of these organizations are also con-

cerned with the Building Fund. This fund started when Dr. Jane Norman gave \$10,000 to the NSTC Alumni to establish a place where the Nova Scotia Normal College Artifacts could be displayed. At the present time they are in storage. The monthly rent is paid from the Building Fund.

The money for the Building Fund was given to the Little White School House to manage. It was their responsibility to look after the money, and issue tax receipts for donations. There is approximately \$54,000 in the fund. This was done because the NS Teachers College Alumni Association doesn't have a tax number. Bill Canning reported that it is actually illegal for LWSH to issue tax receipts for donations made to the Building Fund. It is also illegal for the LWSH to write receipts for Silent Auction Items sold.

Gordon Jeffrey said the LWSH is the legal owner of all items donated to it. He said if the Teachers College Alumni gets a building the LWSH would donate some items to get a NSTC Museum set up.

To get a charitable tax number we have to register with Joint Stock. When we get a charitable tax number we will have to decide how we will manage the Building Fund., and decide how we will set up a NSTC Alumni Museum. We will also have to see how much money we take in, and how much we need to spend or donate each year. We have to spend or donate 80% of the money we take in each year.

Helen MacDonald thanked Bill Canning for coming, and talking to us about the responsibilities of the Little White School House.

Helen suggested the executive look into the suggestions presented by Bill Canning, and present their findings at the April Meeting.

It was moved by Robert Jordan and seconded by Anne Marie LeBlanc that we look into getting a tax number, ways of getting money for the Building Fund, and ways to get some artifacts from the LWSH.

## PNC/NSTC Artifacts

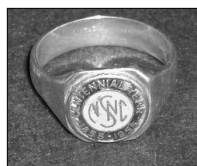

## Little White Schoolhouse Museum

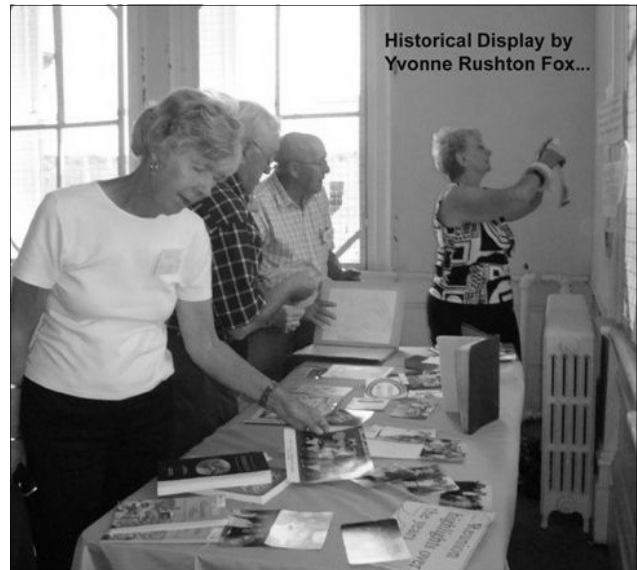
The Little White Schoolhouse Museum (LWSHM) is located on the former NSTC campus (now NSCC Truro Campus) near the corner of Arthur and Willow Streets. The museum is devoted to the history of education in Nova Scotia from the mid-1800's to the early 1970's. The museum itself is a former one-room school which was built in Riverton, Pictou County between 1868 and 1871 and then moved to Truro in 1976.

The LWSHM is operated by a board of directors which is currently chaired by Dr. Gordon Jeffrey (former professor at NSTC). During the summer it is open during the day from Monday to Friday. At other times it is usually open on Tuesday mornings when visitors will often find several former TC faculty and friends socializing and working on various museum projects.

Much of the archived materials from PNC/NSTC are housed in the museum. While the LWSHM and the Alumni Association are, for the most part, not technically connected, our goals do overlap and as a result we maintain a very good cooperative relationship. The museum, its volunteers and Dr. Jeffrey are sources of what seems to be unlimited information on the history of PNC/NSTC and are always very eager to pass along that information or help out when people far and wide get in touch with a wide array of questions.
